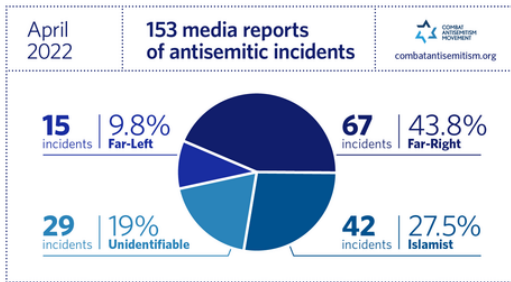
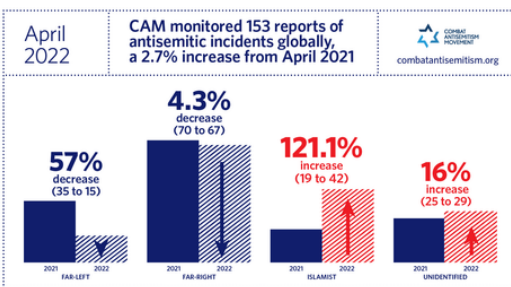

APRIL 2022 INCIDENTS DATA - SHARP RISE IN ISLAMIST ANTISEMITISM

In total, the CAM Information Hub tracked **153 antisemitic incidents reported in the media worldwide in April**, a 2.7% increase from the same month last year, marking a daily average of 5.1 incidents --a slight uptick from 5.0 in April 2021.

April 2022 saw a 121.1% increase in incidents of Islamist antisemitism compared to April 2021, which can be largely attributed to incitement surrounding the issue of Jerusalem holy sites during Ramadan. At the same time, year-to-year decreases of 57.0% and 4.3% in incidents of far-left and far-right antisemitism, respectively, were recorded.

CAM also monitored 19 physical threats against Jews, a 111.1% year-to-year jump, and 49 incidents of antisemitic vandalism, a 2.1% rise.

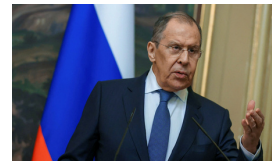

Wave of Terrorism Fueled by Jew-Hatred Leaves 19 Dead Across Israel

Over the past seven weeks, 19 people have been murdered across Israel -- in Beersheba, Hadera, Bnei Brak, Tel Aviv, Ariel, and El'ad -- in a string of terrorist attacks perpetrated by Palestinian and Israeli Arab assailants.

While the affiliations of the terrorists-- including ISIS, Hamas, and the Al-Aqsa Martyrs' Brigades -- have varied, they all shared a common antisemitic ideology that demonizes the Jewish people and denies Israel's right to exist in any form.



Russian FM Lavrov Widely Condemned for 'Hitler Had Jewish Blood' Remark

In a television interview about the ongoing war in Ukraine, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov claimed Nazi leader Adolf Hitler "had Jewish blood" and that the "biggest antisemites were Jewish."

Lavrov's comments drew stern rebukes from Israel and many Jewish groups worldwide.

Public discourse about the Russia-Ukraine conflict has featured a disturbing amount of distortion and trivialization of the Holocaust and Nazism.



Flurry of New Reports Detail Global Surge of Antisemitic Incidents in 2021

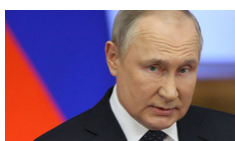
A series of new reports published ahead of Yom HaShoah, Israel's Holocaust Remembrance Day, painted a disturbing picture of rising antisemitism worldwide less than eight decades after the Nazi genocide of the Jewish people.

An annual study released by Tel Aviv University's Center for the Study of European Jewry attributed the global surge of antisemitic incidents to "the strengthening in some countries of the radical populist right and the anti-Zionist radical left."
