
APRIL 2023 INCIDENTS DATA


14.8% of incidents involved physical threats

The CAM Antisemitism Research Center tracked 108 antisemitic reports worldwide in April 2023, marking a daily average of 3.6 incidents. In all of 2022, CAM recorded a total of 1,921 incidents, or an average of 5.3 incidents per day.

April's 2023 saw 56 incidents of far-right antisemitism (51.9% of total), as well as 16 (14.8%), 23 (21.3%), and 13 (12.0%) in the far-left, Islamist, and unidentifiable categories, respectively.

16 physical threats against Jews, as well as 53 incidents of antisemitic vandalism were monitored during the month of April.

"Synagogue of Satan": **Uniting Extremist Groups** in the Revival of an Antisemitic Libel **Online**

The Network Contagion Research Institute (NCRI) and the Combat Antisemitism Movement (CAM) released a firstever report demonstrating how online incitement against Jews and Jewish targets directly correlates with actual physical attacks.

The study examined the spatial signature of tweets containing the "Synagogue of Sătan" term in the U.S. on the county level, which showed that the term significantly correlates with synagogue incidents, an effect that remains robust even when controlling for population.



Dozens of Members of Congress Rally for Jewish American Heritage Month on Capitol Hill

At the U.S. Capitol building, CAM hosted a breakfast for U.S. senators, representatives. and staff to acknowledge Jewish American Heritage Month (JAHM).

Fourteen senators and representatives gave remarks, and more than a dozen other congressional offices were represented from both sides of the aisle.

In addition to a discussion on the security challenges posed by modern-day antisemitism, a panel was also held on the importance of implementing the IHRA Working Definition of Antisemitism.



Study: Holocaust **Education Reduces Hate Crimes Against Minority Communities**

A study by RealityCheck Research - a new nonprofit based in New York, Tel Aviv, and London - found that mandated Holocaust education in U.S. schools reduces hate crimes both against Jews, as well as across a wide swath of minority communities.

The study found that hate crimes against Black communities went down more than 55% in states with Holocaust education laws, while antisemitic crimes dropped 54.8%. Those states also saw drops in hate crimes against Muslims (24%). LGBTQ people (43%), Latinos (34%) and Asian Americans (13%).
