

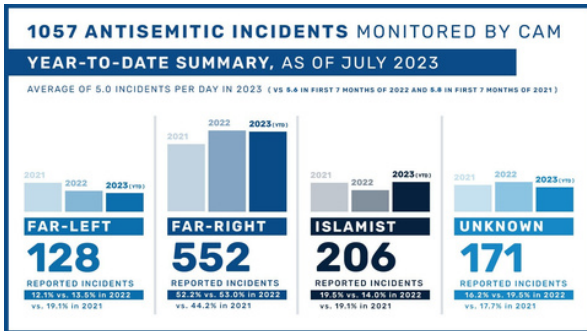
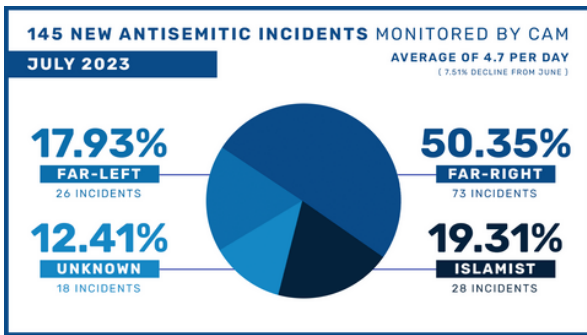
JULY 2023 INCIDENTS DATA

10.34% of incidents involved physical threats

The CAM Antisemitism Research Center tracked **145 antisemitic reports worldwide in July 2023**, marking a daily average of 4.7 incidents. In all of 2022, CAM recorded a total of 1,921 incidents, or an average of 5.3 incidents per day.

July 2023 saw 73 incidents of far-right antisemitism (50.35% of total), as well as 26 (17.93%), 28 (19.31%), and 18 (12.41%) in the far-left, Islamist, and unidentifiable categories, respectively.

15 physical threats against Jews, as well as 38 incidents of antisemitic vandalism, were monitored during the month of July.

IHRA Antisemitism Definition Adoptions in 2023 on Track to Surpass Last Year's

A total of 78 entities across the globe adopted or endorsed the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) Working Definition of Antisemitism in the first half of 2023, according to data compiled by the CAM Antisemitism Research Center and Tel Aviv University's Center for the Study of Contemporary European History.

The 78 adoptions marked 85.7% of the 91 adoptions in all of 2022, making it likely 2023's total will surpass last year's.

This brought the overall number of IHRA Working Definition of Antisemitism adoptions and endorsements worldwide to 1,192.

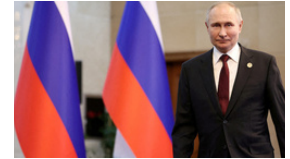


Jews and Muslims Come Together at Global Virtual Solidarity Rally

The disturbing news from Europe over the past month challenged freedom of religion and belief.

Qurans were burned, and revered texts of the other Abrahamic faiths also faced threats, with the situation seeming to escalate by the day.

Jewish Historian Warns of Growing Antisemitic Climate in Russia

As Russia retreats further into the ultranationalist politics that have underpinned its invasion of Ukraine, the country's centuries-long tradition of antisemitic agitation has been reactivated, according to a Russian Jewish historian, who is openly wondering whether those Jews who remain there may once again face deadly persecution.

Ksenia Krimer reflected that prior to the Ukraine war, many Russian liberals – both Jews and non-Jews – comforted themselves by saying that whatever his other flaws, "at least Putin is not antisemitic." However, that claim now rests on more shaky grounds, she asserted.

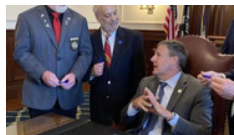
